As a side benefit, if there was a stamp collector in the family, they were a great source of stamps from exotic places around the world. The downside was it could take forever to get that last needed card. Like maybe a couple of years!

But time and technology march on. Now we have LoTW, eQSL, and the every present PayPal serving as new ways to get those confirmations. Why bother with confirmations? Well, they are fun to collect, especially the paper QSL cards. They are needed for Worked All States, Worked All Continents, DXCC, etc., etc. Not everyone likes to chase awards but awards do give us goals and reasons beyond rag chewing to stay active and on the air. Get on Board QSLing at January GARS TechFest / Chuck Catledge AE4CW

NFARL and the SEDXC are teaming up to help Hams get into the QSLing game “Fast and Easy” at TechFest on Saturday, January 14 at the Gwinnett Medical Resource Center in Lawrenceville. Our resident experts, Wes - W3WL, Bill - N4NX and Chaz - W4GKF will present a 50 minute program titled “Pitfalls / Solutions for DX QSLing” explaining all the “ins and outs” of obtaining QSL cards from all those elusive DX stations around the world. These folks know their stuff, and if you are looking for awards or just that great card from an exotic location, this program is designed just for you.



In addition we will have a booth in the “main-tent” where you can get hands-on help with the following:

- Setting up your personal Logbook of the World (LoTW) account (bring your laptop and make it extra easy)

Your NFARL club membership record / Fred Moore N4CLA

As you know, NFARL has gone to electronic membership records that are maintained on what is called the MART. These records are Userid and Password protected. These records are how we as a club maintain contact with our members. We try to make sure that all the information is correct in each of these records and we need your help in this maintenance process. By the way, we do "NOT" store any personal information i.e.; SS#, bank account numbers, or credit card numbers. All we ask for is your current telephone numbers and USPS mailing address, FCC license information, email address and some other basic information, all of which can change and we have no control over. All of this data can be managed by YOU. This includes your USERID and your PASSWORD for access to these records. Your USERID can be changed at any time to anything and unlike a lot of other systems the USERID is not a permanent name. If you have forgotten your USERID, PLEASE do not create another record. Ask for help and we can reset that to anything you want. Another important field that needs to be current is your email address. We depend on that address to be correct so we can send you important club information as well as your monthly eNEWS.

Here is another interesting bit of information. People change their Internet Service Providers fairly often, and most often for price. Did you know if your email address is tied to that ISP, and you change to another ISP, your email address from the old ISP goes away and everything about it. This now means that you need to notify "ALL" of your contacts indicating that you have changed your email address to yet another email address. If you do not want that aggravation, consider using an email address by Gmail, Yahoo, Hotmail or one of those that is not directly connected to any ISP.

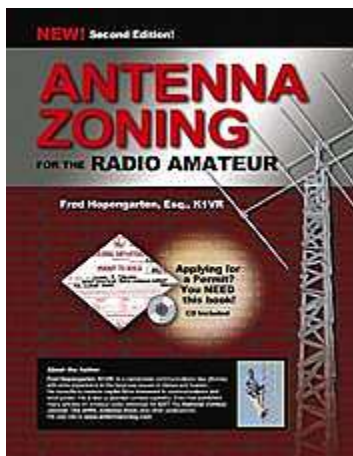

Antenna Zoning Help is in the Library [Keith Plossl K4KRX

Several Amateurs have expressed that their homeowners association won't permit antennas and thus Amateur Radios can't be used in homes in their association. Really? Here is the book for December. We suggest reading the following first.

Antenna Zoning for the Radio Amateur by Fred Hopengarten, Esq., K1VR

By far the dominant reference for zoning matters related to towers and antennas, both amateur and commercial, is authored by Fred Hopengarten, K1VR. Fred is both an active amateur radio operator and a highly skilled lawyer specializing in antenna zoning matters. The cost of either of his books is de minimus compared to the costs of a lawsuit or relocation. You can do no better than to follow Fred's recommendations at all stages of the process.



The book is designed to give you a view of the entire process and help you avoid the pitfalls that others have fallen into along the way. It is a college course in the subject at a graduate level. Some few may discover after reading it that they came across the book too late in the process and would be better off changing their plans or looking for a second dream house.

NFARL has copies of this book in the library. Can you afford not to read one before putting up that new antenna?

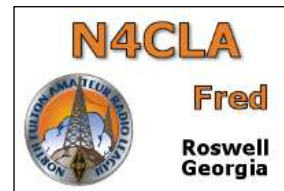
