

Youth News – Frances, AJ4JQ

My First Dayton Experience - This year my dad (N4JJD), my brother (KJ4NRN), Christopher



Howard (KJ4HYG), and I (AJ4JQ) made the trek up to the Dayton Hamvention for the first time. I had heard how huge it was, and was very excited about all the neat things we'd get to see and the people we'd get to meet. We drove up all day Thursday, and on the way we talked to a few people who were also on their way to Dayton. After getting settled in the hotel room, Edward talked to several people on the radio from our room (which was on the 9th floor), who were also there for the Hamvention.

On Friday morning, we were up bright and early so we could get there right when it opened. The first place we went was the Hara arena, where many of the big dealers were. We wandered around and looked a many different booths, and saw lots of interesting headgear. There was one guy with a miniature tower on a helmet, someone with a Cat-in-the-Hat hat with an antenna on the side, and several people with orange helmets with antennas on the top.

After a while, we went to Ball Arena Hall, and found the ARRL Youth Lounge, where I was going to volunteer for a while. There were several kids who stopped by the lounge who were already licensed, but many of the kids did not really know much about ham radio. There were different activities the kids could do to earn certain amounts of points, with which they could get prizes at the end. Some of the activities were sending their name in CW, making a contact on the radio (with a control operator, of course), decorating a QSL card, and reciting the phonetic alphabet. They had a lot of fun, and most seemed pretty interested. After the Youth Lounge, I wandered around the ARRL Expo section, looking at the different booths.

On Saturday, we walked around some more, looking at the Flex booth, the Icom booth, the Yaesu booth, the Kenwood booth, the YLRL booth, and Gordon West's booth, just to name a few. And of course, we visited the North Fulton ARL's booth too.





While we were on our way to the Youth Lounge again, we stopped by the QSO Show's booth to see Jim Stafford (W4QO) being interviewed live about being the Ham of the Year. (The QSO Show is a show about ham radio that is broadcast on shortwave). After Jim was finished, they asked Christopher, Edward, and I to sit down too and be interviewed. We were asked questions about how we got into ham radio, what we thought was the best way to get youth interested in ham radio and things like that. It was a lot of fun, and there were probably several thousand people listening to the show at the time. After that, we continued on to the Youth

Lounge, and there we were all interviewed for the local Dayton NPR station. That was fun, too, and we had a great (though tiring) day.

On Sunday, we slept in, which was wonderful, because we were all tired from our late nights and early mornings. We checked out of the hotel, and headed over to the Hara Arena to see the presentation of the Club of the Year and Ham of the Year awards. Since we were all NFARL members, we got to stand with all the other members as Chuck (AE4CW) accepted the award for our club and Jim (W4QO) got his award. After that, we headed out and started the long drive back to Atlanta. We left with a lot of hats, bags, pens, stickers, keychains, magazines, catalogues, and cards, and a lot of new friends. We enjoyed every minute of it, and can't wait until the next time we can make it up there.

Antenna Special Interest Group (SIG) June – Wes, W3WL



The Antenna SIG completed its 5th month with a face-to-face work session at the Masonic Hall. In attendance were 17 SIGers and 8 antenna tuners of various lineages. All the antenna tuners were opened up and inspected by the group, and a good appreciation of what it takes to match an antenna/feed line system to the transmitter was further appreciated. In addition, most all in attendance had their lap tops with them, and a tutorial, lead by

Chuck, AE4CW, took us through the ARRL antenna modeling software using examples of what we have learned thus far in the AntSIG.

The hands-on session was of great benefit to all who attended. In addition, the group discussed further topics for future Antenna SIG investigations. Two topics that were very popular were Antenna Modeling and Smith Charting. We are also investigating a Club buy of a more robust version of EZNEC. Please let Wes - W3WL (<u>w3wl@nfarl.org</u>) know of other topics you are interested in. A new group of learning experiences is being planned to begin in September.

This month we are focusing on **Wire Antenna Construction**, with the last face-to-face session being planned to actually build individual wire antennas as needed by the participants. Don't forget to join in the AntSIG net on Thursdays at 8:30 as we discus this month's topic!

North Fulton ARES – Jim, N4SEC



North Fulton ARES (Amateur Radio Emergency Service) meetings are held at the City of Sandy Springs Municipal Complex on the second Tuesday of each month at 7:00 PM. The next meeting is June 8. There is an informal gathering for dinner prior to the meeting at about 5:30 PM at nearby Tijuana Joe's on Roswell Road. All amateurs are welcome and you do not have to be a NFARES member to attend.

NFARES conducts a Net every Sunday night at 8:30 PM on the 147.060 (+) (Tone 100 Hz) repeater located on the Roswell water tower. The backup

repeater is the NFARL 145.47. All amateurs are invited to participate in the net regardless of ARES affiliation.

The May meeting was led by Mike Cohen, AD4MC and concentrated on VHF/UHF cross band repeat. There was a live active demonstration using multiple dual band radios and simplex handheld radios. A number of practical applications were reviewed, including Mike's use of vehicular cross band repeat during the 60 mile Sandy Springs Cycle Challenge and implementation of cross band equipment at ChatComm, the 911 service provider to Sandy Springs and Johns Creek. The use of these "Mobile repeaters" to enhance VHF simplex coverage of North Fulton County was discussed. They could be rapidly deployed to fill any coverage gaps during drills and actual emergencies.

NFARES Meeting on Tuesday June 8: Mike Cohen, AD4MC will be presenting **"Cross Band Repeat Part 2"**. As in the May meeting, this will be a live demonstration with attendees participating. The focus of the June meeting will feature setting up tone squelch to minimize false keying. A hands-on workshop will be conducted to help you set up your radios for tone/tone squelch to use with cross band repeat during future SET and ChatComm exercises. Bring along your 2-meter radio (and manual if you have it) to join the fun!

City of Milton update: Tom Koch, W4UOC, Dave Hazel, KD9RU, and Jim Paine, N4SEC met with Milton Fire Chief Bob Edgar and Emergency Operations Director Matthew Marietta. Tom led the discussion and PowerPoint presentation explaining ARES and our active role in other North Fulton municipalities. The discussion went extremely well and NFARES members, coordinated by Dave, Milton AEC, will be making a survey of Milton's three fire stations followed by recommendations on equipment needed to work with the other North Fulton agencies.



This is just a friendly reminder regarding your NFARL and ARRL memberships. It has now been 55 weeks ago that we moved all of our membership to the NFARL.ORG web site from the QuickBooks environment. We have tried to make sure that all the bits and bytes are in their proper places for each membership record. You should now be receiving automatic renewal notification for your NFARL and ARRL memberships 30 days before your membership expires. This should give you plenty of time to renew on line before your expiration occurs. However, as with all database migrations, there will be exceptions. If you feel that your name is not on the membership roles, and should be, or it is incorrectly categorized, please send a note to N4CLA @ NFARL.org The other piece of this is that your name will automatically fall off the membership roles exactly 365 days after the expiration date. You can, however, automatically renew your membership at any time and the new renewal is just added to the current expiration date. You can do this at www.nfarl.org/mart

Your email address

Here are some words for thought about your email address. I am not advocating changing your email address but I think that you might want to be made aware of the pit falls of owning an email address offered by your Internet Service Provider (ISP)

In today's world of electronic email, and offers made to you for bundling and the lure of cheaper prices, you tend to loose all your email as the result of taking the bait if you don't take steps to save these emails before moving to your new service provider. There are a lot of you today that have email addresses that have been offered to you by your ISP and also using their WebMail options. These typically are xxx@charter.xxx, xxx@comcast.xxx, xxx@bellsouth.net, xxx@clear.xxx, xxx@att.xxx, email accounts and the list goes on and on.

My suggestion is that you use one of the free email service providers such as GMAIL, YAHOO, HOTMAIL and there are others out there where you are not dependent on your ISP. Remember, they do not care about your email. When you change your ISP, your email account is flushed FOREVER. It is GONE!

All I am trying to suggest is that if you care about your email history, then be proactive. Yes you will have to notify everyone in your email list that you are changing, but you will only have to do this once.

Then we have email accounts that are subscription based. The one that I can think of specifically is the ARRL email forwarding account that ARRL offers. The caveat to this one is that if you are using that email account and you let your ARRL membership expire, then your xxx@arrl.net goes silently away on the last day of your membership, and people that depend on maintaining contact with you at that address will "NEVER" know that your email account went silent SK, because ARRL does not send a bounce message to the sender that you do not exist anymore. These people that are trying to get in contact with you just think you do not want to communicate with them anymore and that you are ignoring them.

Anyway, these are a couple of things that you might need to consider regarding your email habits.
