

Two Books Explore Timely Topics / Keith Plossl K4KRX

There are two major events for NFARL in October: The T32C DXpedition to Christmas Island and the ARES Simulated Emergency Test. The library has two books recommended on these topics: The Complete DX'er by Bob Locher W9KNI and The ARRL Emergency Communication Handbook edited by Steve Ford WB8IMY.

The Complete DX'er covers how to build the skills needed to be more effective at DXing. It does assume that hams can also use CW. However, reading between the lines, one can learn the all-important lessons of how to listen. Listening is key to DXing in the author's view. This could be a very valuable book for those who are interested in more effective DXing.

The second book is The ARRL Emergency Communication Handbook, which explains how emergency communications help during real emergencies. The fact is that when all else fails it is volunteer radio amateurs who handle the communications during local and national emergencies. This book covers emergency communications from beginning to end as a beginner needs to understand it.





My New Motto: Just Do It ... / Chuck Catledge AE4CW

Many of you know that I'm pretty anal about perfecting my antennas, so I thought I'd share my alter-ego antenna story.

I was determined to work T32C, the DXpedition to Christmas Island, on as many bands as possible while at the beach this past week. Unfortunately, I had only vertical antennas for 40 meters through 10 meters, but I had been lucky to work the DXpedition on each of those bands except 40 meters. Of course, I had made sure that the verticals were perfectly tuned with SWRs well under 2:1 and was also sure that had helped me snag T32C so easily.



As luck would have it, while looking for them on 40, I found then calling CQ on 80 CW ... and I didn't have an 80-meter antenna! Bummer! But, for some reason I pushed the antenna tuner button to see if there was a chance of tuning the 40-meter vertical ... and amazingly it worked! And, more amazingly, I worked T32C on either the first or second call.

I got to wondering how much power I was actually radiating, so I went out with my AIM-4170 antenna analyzer and measured the 40-meter vertical on 3.51 MHz where the T32C had been calling CQ. The SWR was **290:1** (yes, really!) with an R of 4.3 ohms and an X of -245 ohms. With 100 feet of RG-8 and RG-8x coax, I calculated that 7 watts was getting to the antenna and considerably less than 1 watt was being radiated real QRP.

So, I now have a new motto: If the SWR is less than 300:1, call CQ!
