We have some special activities coming up. Having won the Club Georgia QSO Party competition several years in a row, we have decided to play the game a little differently. This year we are asking all NFARL members to donate their GA QSO Party points to some other club. We all belong to several different specialty clubs such as QCWA Chapter 49, North Georgia QRP etc., and we suggest your points be donated to another organization of your choosing. NFARL is going to have an intraclub competition. The club will be divided into two teams in the spirit of "Shirts vs. Skins" or "Red vs. Blue."

Jim Stafford W4QO is heading up this effort. Please come and hear Jim as he explains how all of this is going to work. Get involved in the process of setting up the teams. Talk a little trash about the opponents! Get some team rivalry going!



## NFARL Hams Melt Solder, Build a Balun / Chuck Catledge AE4CW

On Sunday, March 4, sixteen NFARL hams gathered for the first Build-a-Thon of 2012. Based on a

club-wide survey, the project chosen was the Elecraft BL2 Wideband 1:1 & 4:1 (Switchable) 250W Balun (at right). Chuck Catledge AE4CW kicked off the session with a chalk-talk on "What does a balun do, and why do you need one?" Coaches Jim Stafford W4QO and Mack McCormick W4AX helped participants get started and suggested techniques for wiring and soldering. As this was the first soldering activity for a number of the participants, the simplicity of the design and ease of construction made this a



great learning experience. At the end of the build, the performance of each balun was tested with a

Vector Impedance Antenna Analyzer. And the results? Every balun tested perfectly, meeting the design SWR from 160M through 6M. Way to go, Build-a-Thon team!! A big thank you goes to Mack for offering his QTH and providing tables, chairs, electrical service and refreshments for each participant. For more photos, click <u>here</u>.

#### Brandon Hall Hosts Roundup / Mike Cohen AD4MC and Tom Koch W4UOC

An Atlanta private school, Brandon Hall, <u>http://brandonhall.org/</u>, has shown an interest in amateur radio by hosting the ARRL School Club Roundup, <u>http://www.arrl.org/school-club-roundup</u>.

Thanks to the efforts of Tom Koch W4UOC, working closely with middle school science teacher James Vaught, NF ARES / NFARL supported Brandon Hall School on February 15 during the School Club Roundup. NFARL members installed HF and VHF stations and antennas and invited the students to operate the radios. North American, European and Middle Eastern hams were contacted

Tom W4UOC, Clyde McClain AK4TL, Wes Lamboley W3WL, Chuck Catledge AE4CW, Jim Stafford W4QO, Mike Cohen AD4MC and Edward Doyle KJ4NRN helped with set-up and operation of the stations and antennas. Since Edward KJ4NRN was the same age as many of the students, he turned out to be perhaps our best ham radio ambassador. About a dozen students, parents and teachers took part in the activity.

Wes W3WL and Chuck AE4CW hope to hold HamCram sessions at this impressive campus on the banks of the Chattahoochee River in the Dunwoody area. Mr. Vaught plans to attend the ARRL Teachers Conference this summer. Hopefully, this will lead to the school having a permanent ham radio station.

It's a given that a lack of age diversity is a major issue with the growth of ham radio. The interest shown by the teachers, parents and students at Brandon Hall can result in a win-win for our hobby and the school.

Author Jim Kearman KR1S discovered the thrill of DXing shortly after receiving his General Class license in 1963. After more than 40 years, the fluttery sounds of radio signals from faraway places still thrill him. In short, he still chases DX because it's great fun!


We hope this book will inspire you to try DXing, and that you'll use it as a guide to begin your own DX journey.


# Scouts Work on Radio Merit Badges / Jon Wittlin K4WIT

The Publix Georgia Marathon has asked the ham radio community to assist with the 2012 Marathon on Sunday, March 18. This is a large event requiring dozens of amateur radio volunteers.

Our job is to communicate race-related messages for the race officials and race volunteers that ultimately ensure the safety of the runners. A majority of the assignments are for Aid Station communicators. These volunteers will be stationed at one of the 19 Aid Stations and communicate supply needs, lead runner information, and make SAG Wagon requests for injured and tired runners. These duties end when the end of the race passes the station.

You will need to provide your own radio. If you do not yet have a radio but still want to help out, indicate so on the sign-up form and we will work with you to find a radio you can borrow for the day.
